

Constitutional Changes

Constitution has become more democratic

- 15th: Black male suffrage
- 17th: Direct election of Senators
- 19th: Women's suffrage
- 24th: Abolished poll taxes
- 26th: 18yr old to vote

Growth of Power in the Executive Branch

- Bureaucracy
- Expansion of govt programs
- Post 9/11- Patriot Act

MADISONIAN MODEL

Fear that majority and minority factions could threaten the government

Solution: Set up precautions that will prevent this from happening

SEPARATION OF POWERS

CHECKS AND BALANCES

Separate the power between three branches of government Each branch can prevent the other branches from becoming omnipowerful


FEDERALISM


Share the power between the national government and the state governments
