The Legislative Branch: Article I Scavenger Hunt

Read through Article I of the U.S. Constitution. You can also find copies of Article I anywhere on the web, however, the following website: **house.gov/house/Constitution/Constitution.html** is a good website to use. Be sure to include the section number and clause number for each item, see the correct format in question #1 below.

- 1. The presiding officer of the House is the Speaker of the House. Section 2, Clause 5
- 2. A Representative must be a citizen for seven years, twenty-five years old, and live in the state.
- 3. All bills must be passed by the House and the Senate, and presented to the President.
- 4. The Vice President is the presiding officer of the Senate.
- 5. No state can make a treaty with a foreign country.
- 6. The governor has the authority to call an election to fill a vacancy in the House of Representatives.
- 7. Expulsion can be used to remove a member of either house of Congress for an infraction of the rules.
- 8. A person convicted by the impeachment process can still be tried in a regular court if he or she violated U.S. law.
- 9. Congress has the power to borrow money on the credit of the United States.
- 10. Congress has the power to make all laws which are necessary and proper to execute all other powers (Elastic Clause).
- 11. Congress has the power to establish post offices.
- 12. Congress has the power to declare war.
- 13. Congress cannot grant titles of nobility.
- 14. All revenue bills must originate in the House of Representatives.
- 15. Congressmen are paid a salary out of the treasury of the United States.
- 16. A term in the Senate is six years for each senator.
- 17. Congress has the power to establish a uniform rule of naturalization.
- 18. Two Senators from each state were appointed by state legislatures (not elected by popular vote).
- 19. Congress is required to assemble at least once per year.
- 20. Congress is required to keep a record of its meetings, including a record of the votes of its members.
